# <u>Trustees' report</u> for the year ended 30th September 2019

The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 30th September 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" FRS102 in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

#### Objectives and activities

The purpose of the River Of Life Church is to establish the Kingdom of God as laid down in the Bible (Old and New Testaments). Alongside the church, the charity operates a Christian bookshop and coffee shop.

#### Achievements and performance

Our 30th anniversary celebrations continued into the late autumn of the year, concluding a wonderful celebration of thanksgiving for all that God has done through the work of the Church, in hundreds of people's lives. This year the Church continued to grow in numbers and in strength. The emphasis on meeting needs in our community developed, although we closed our CAP Debt Centre and Job Clubs due to a lack of demand for those services and the cost of the CAP franchise. We formed an arrangement with local Aldi stores, through third party agents, Neighbourly, to receive surplus food and distribute those items to people in need.

We continued to be positively involved with many aspects of the local community, through Dumfries High School, youth work, pastoral care, food provision and town centre regeneration.

We took on the role of 'convenor' of Dumfries Christian Network, which brings a wide range of Churches, Christian organisations and individuals together to arrange joint events and foster a spirit of togetherness.

We became involved with a new organisation, Dumfries Station Trust, which seeks to regenerate redundant railway and station buildings, bringing them back to use for community purposes.

A wide range of teams are going well: hosting, media, children/crèche, pastoral, practical and music/worship.

We began restructuring the charity as a SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation), and the new entity has been registered. We plan to transition to the new SCIO during the next year.

In December 2018 we were offered the chance to purchase 12 Queensberry Street prior to it being placed at auction in London. With the amazing generosity of local individuals and the Goshen Trust, for gifts and loans, we successfully secured the property in February, which we had previously rented for more than 16 years. Repayments to the Goshen Trust are over 10 years; instead of rent, we're paying repayments to generate capital equity for the charity.

12 Queensberry Street is a valuable hub for the Church as well as housing Kings Coffee and Books. The facility has been used throughout the year for a range of Church events as well as providing a venue for other Churches, concerts and gatherings.

We erected a colourful "Umbrella Sky" installation across Queensberry Street in the autumn of 2019, to brighten up the area. It proved to be a huge success, hitting the headlines as a positive contribution to the town ethos.

The multicultural flavour of our charity continues to be a great strength and we have two employees through the Home Office visa sponsor licence we hold - one from Brazil and the other from the USA.

# <u>Trustees' report</u> for the year ended 30th September 2019

#### Plans for future periods

Church - Further development of community outreach through the food project, schools work and a positive influence for regenerating the town. Seeking larger premises in which to meet for Sunday services and events, with the present building becoming too small for our growing congregation. We plan to express interest with Dumfries & Galloway Council for the Community Asset Transfer of the Loreburn Hall in Dumfries, following promising initial conversations.

Kings - Building on our strengths as a coffee shop which has endured the pressures on the town centre. Creating a more attractive and distinctive food offer, as well as maintaining our focus as a great place to be and enjoy top class artisan coffee.

#### Financial review

The Charity achieved a surplus of £14,044 for the year compared to a deficit of £10,205 the previous year. This has reduced the deficit on unrestricted funds from £37,615 to £23,571 to carry forward. Kings Christian Bookshop showed a deficit of £14,390, as opposed to £20,551 deficit in the previous year. The River of Life Church showed a surplus of £28,434, as opposed to a surplus of £12,836 in the previous year.

The charity currently has a deficit on unrestricted funds and the Trustees are aware of the need to address this. The charity has in place a large overdraft facility on each bank account, which goes some way to ensuring that the charity can meet liabilities as they fall due. Individuals with a close connection to the charity have also loaned money to assist with cashflow. The Charity as at 30th September 2019 was in the throes of changing its constitution to a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) and upon this change it will be able to gain access to substantially more grant monies.

#### Reserves policy

The Trustees have adopted a policy whereby unrestricted funds are maintained at a level equivalent to between three to six months expenditure. In the event that the charity should suffer a significant drop in funding, this level of reserves would enable the charity to continue with its current activities whilst alternative sources of income are found. At 30th September 2019 the charity's unrestricted funds are in deficit and individuals with a close connection to the charity have loaned money to assist with cashflow. The Trustees hope to better address this situation in the coming year.

### Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and financing of the charity and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to these risks. These systems are reviewed periodically to ensure that they still meet the needs of the charity.

#### Structure, governance and management

The River Of Life Church is a charitable unincorporated organisation set up in April 1992, and is governed by its constitution.

#### Recruitment and appointment

The trustees are always on the lookout for responsible people who can help the Church grow and provide a firm foundation for the governance of the charity. Decisions for recruitment lie with the existing trustees and suitable people would need to be held in high regard in the Christian community, of integrity and treasure the values we hold dear, in accordance with our Statement of Faith and sound biblical theology.

#### **Volunteers**

The Trustees are grateful for the unstinting efforts of volunteers who have assisted with the activities of the charity. The Trustees wish to thank all of those who have contributed to the charity and the members and attendees of the River Of Life Church for their strong commitment throughout the year.

# Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of River Of Life Church

I report to the charity trustees on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 30th September 2019 which are set out on pages 5 to 14.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1)(a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under Section 44(1)(c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

#### Basis of the independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

#### Independent examiner's statement

In the course of my examination, no matter has come to my attention

b. to which, in my opinion, attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached, except that which is outlined below.

#### Emphasis of matter - going concern

I have considered the adequacy of the disclosures made in note 19 to the accounts concerning the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The charity achieved a surplus of of £14,044 during the year ended 30th September 2019, which has reduced the deficit on unrestricted funds to £23,571. These conditions, along with the matters explained in note 19 to the accounts, indicate the existence of a material uncertainty which casts doubt over the charity's ability to continue as a going concern and is significant enough to warrant being highlighted in my report. The accounts do not include the adjustments that would result if the charity was unable to continue as a going concern.

# Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 30th September 2019

#### 1. Summary of significant accounting policies

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

#### 1.1. General information and basis of preparation

River of Life Church is an unincorporated charity. The nature of the charities operations are included in the trustees report.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16th July 2014 (as updated through Update Bulletin 1 published on 2th February 2016), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity has applied Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2nd February 2016 amd does not include a cash flow statement on the gounds that it is applying FRS102 Section 1A.

The financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity.

#### 1.2. Income recognition

All income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations to be recognised the charity will have been notified of the amount and settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the donation and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained then the income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the charity and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Income from trading activities includes income earned from fundraising events and trading activities to raise funds for the charity. Income is received in exchange for supplying goods and services in order to raise funds and is recognised when entitlement has occurred.

Income from Kings Coffee shop is included, exclusive of VAT, in the statement of financial activities on an accruals basis.

#### 1.3. Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised when there is a constructive or legal obligation to make payment, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount can be measured reliably.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Expenditure on raising funds includes all expenditure incurred by the charity to raise funds for its charitable purposes. Costs of raising funds include the running of Kings coffee and bookshop.

# Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 30th September 2019

#### 1.4. Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:

Unrestricted general funds - these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees. The Trustees may set aside monies for specific future purposes in a designated fund. Designated funds form part of unrestricted funds.

Restricted funds - these are funds that can only be used for a particular restricted purpose within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

#### 1.5. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

The Trustees have adopted a policy whereby assets costing less than £100 will be charged as an expense in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are purchased. All other assets are capitalised. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Land and buildings

1/2% Straight Line (Buildings only)

Tenants improvements

10% Straight Line

Fixtures, fittings

and equipment

25% Straight Line

### 1.6. Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

#### 1.7. Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

### 1.8. Pensions

The pension costs charged in the financial statements represent the contribution payable by the company during the year.

#### 1.9. Irrecoverable VAT

A proportion of the output VAT on cold carry outs from the coffee shop is deemed to be irrecoverable by HM Revenue & Customs. Following a VAT visit, HM Revenue and Customs have agreed that output VAT for each period should be calculated by deducting 10% of the total output VAT due.
